MINUTES OF MASTERS' MEETING, 2nd SEPTEMBER 1953.

The object of the Meeting was to cover the routine for the beginning of the first term: Friday, 25th September, Saturday and Sunday, the 26th and 27th September. The Headmaster said he hoped to be able to use the usual routine from Monday, the 28th September.

Friday, 25th September.

The boys will arrive in groups, by lorry, and possibly some in their parents' cars, during the afternoon and early evening. The Porter, who will then be in uniform, will meet the boys at the main entrance, and will take them straight to Mr. York who will collect matches or lighters, ration books, medical certificates etc. House Tutor, Mr. Thomson, will then take the boys to the Matron, who will show them round the dormitories and tell them which bathrooms sto. they may use. They will then be taken down to the Common Room by Mr. Harland who will generally look after them. The Bursar said he would see that the first lot of periodicals was available in the Common Room, together with table tennis, darts etc.

The Bursar will show the boys round the underground areas in groups, and will also show them the Library, Chapel and Dining Room. Those boys who arrived early in the afternoon will need tea and the Head Master suggested they should have this in the Dining Hall with the Press Representatives. This was agreed. The Head Master also suggested that a fairly substantial meal should be prepared for the boys later in the evening, possibly at 7 p.m. but the Bursar will arrange the time for this meal at a later date. It was suggested that the Headmaster, the Bursar, the Matron, Mr. York, Mr. Harland and Mr. Thomson should have supper with the boys on this first evening and this was agreed.

After supper, probably at 7.45 p.m., the boys will go to the Common Room for a short talk by the Headmaster, when he will give them the routine for Saturday, 26th September. He would like Mr. York, Mr. Harland and Mr. Thomson to attend this meeting. He would like Mr.

COLLEGE RULES

INTHODUCTION

- (a) Duty of every boy to learn these rules as soon as he joins The College.
 - (b) These rules are in force from the time a boy arrives at Welbeck at the beginning of term until the time of his departure at the end of term.
 - (c) The College prefects are responsible to the college and for the enforcement of these rules.

BOUNDS OF

- The College bounds are defined by a red line on the map displayed on the Common Boom Notice Board. No boy may proceed beyond these bounds without permission from his Housemaster.
- The following are strictly out of bounds:-3.
 - (a) All tunnels except those in the official use of the College.
 - (b) All roofs, including those over the Common Room, class rooms and Great Hall.
 - (c) The grass verges on either side of the main drive.
- Dormitories may not be entered between 9 a.m. and bed time.
- The Dining Hall and Kitchen Block may only be entered at seal times. 5.
- Class rooms and laboratories may only be entered for duly authorised purposes.

ABSSIES

- No boy may go outside the College buildings between "lock-up" and breakfast. The time of "lock-up" is notified from the to time by the Headmaster.
- No boy may be absent from any moal without permission from his Housemaster.
- No boy may be absent from any College period, C.C.F. parade, Chapel Service (excluding Holy Communion), except for ill health, without leave from the Headmanter.

10. "Leave-off" may only be given by a chit signed by the Medical Officer or by the Housemanter.

DESIGN AND TOWN OUT

- II. Only the official clothing issued by the College may be worn.
- 12. All articles of elething, which are not in use, will invariably be kept in the proper place provided for them.

VISTED OF PARTIES

1). Parents and relations may visit boys on the visiting days which are notified to mingly. A boy wishing to proceed outside the College Bounds with his parents or relations must obtain his Monachaster's parmianton to do so.

GE ERAL RULES

- 18. The following are forbidden: smoking, drinking alcoholic liquors, sweepstakes, lotteries, betting and gambling.
- 19. The possession or use of fire arms, fireworks, knives (other than folding pocket knives), catapults or any other weapons which propal missiles is forbidden, and stones may not be thrown.
- 20. No eating is allowed except in the Diming Hall, Tuck Shop and Gommon Room.
- 21. The borrowing of clothes is forbidden.
- 22. The Great Hall may only be used for P.T., boxing, fencing and badminton. Permission must be obtained from the Headmaster before it is used for any other purpose.
- 23. No boy may visit any private house without leave from his Housemaster.
- 24. Fixtures and other matters relating to College games must be referred to the Master in charge of the game concerned.
- 25. Boys may not toboggam or go on the ice without the permission of the Heudmaster and snowballs may not be thrown within one hundred yards of any building.
- 26. (a) No boy may borrow money from any person except his Housemaster.
 - (b) No boy may buy any article from another boy without his Housemaster's permission.
- 27. At the end of term no boy may leave the College before the time appointed by the Headmaster.
- 28. It is the duty of every boy to inspect the College Notice Roard daily for supplementary rules and enters.

MINUTES OF MASTERS' MUSTING, 4th SEPTEMBER 1953.

The object of the Moeting was to discuss the marking system, form orders, masters' meetings, reports, and internal examinations.

REPORTS:

The report forms were discussed and it was decided not to enter marks on these, but to use letters A, B, G and D., with plus or minus signs where necessary. As the War Office needs an annual report on each boy carbon paper will be provided with the report forms so that they may be done in duplicate.

STAFF MEETINGS.

As the boys are 6th form boys there should be the minimum of The Headmaster suggested that Staff Meetings should be held at regular intervals and Mr. Davoy suggested that one should be held every three weeks. This was agreed. Morday afternoons were suggested for these Meetings but this will be decided later.

MARKING.

Each Subject Master should keep a record of each boy's work. The record for this is to be kept in the mark book. The Head Master said that Form Lists would be produced then forms have been decided.

The subject of the form orders was brought up and Mr. Davey wondered if it was necessary to use form order books provided. It was decided that these could be dispensed with, but that form lists should be typed and put in a folder in the Masters' Common Room, and these should be filled in and given to the Headmaster just prior to the 3 weekly Meeting After the first term these lists will be printed. The marking system for this will be:

Mr. York said he would need to have a note of the effort each boy is making, as well as the actual marks he obtains in each subject. For this there will be an additional column for each subject and a plus der will show that a boy is making a good effort, and a minus sign that is not making sufficient effort. MINUTES OF MASTERS' MEETING, 7th SUPPLEMENT, 1953-

The object of the Meeting was to discuss the issue, storage and care of clothing, books and stationery, sports equipment etc.

The Bursar opened by giving a general picture of the financial set-up.

ISSUE OF BOOKS AND STATIONERY

Heads of Departments should draw text books, stationery etc. at 10.30 a.m. on the 24th September. The Headmaster said that some helpers will be asked to be available for carrying books from the Stationery Store (triangular room at end of boys' Common Room) to the Classrooms. When books are collected will Heads of Departments please initial the Bursar's card index. The Form Masters will be respensible for collecting the books from the boys at the end of term. When books are issued to the boys they must put their names etc. on the labblinmediately. It was decided that for the first term the Form Masters will issue all books and keep a record of them. The Heads of Departments were asked to tell the Form Masters which books to issue.

STATIONERY

The various note books were shown to the Staff - Maths. book, Science book etc. There is a loose leaf note book for each boy, and for tests etc. work will be done in these. Folders will be provided for each subject, if required, with punched paper (foolscap). At the moment there are insufficient folders for this, and Mr. Ward said that the folders used by the Office for filing would suit his purpose. The Bursar said he would try and get enough folders in stock for the beginning of term.

CLOTHING

All clothing is issued by the College and the boys must take great care of everything. An allowance of 4/6 per head per term is allowed to cover repair outfits - sewing cotton etc. Three pairs of grey trousers will be provided and these will have to be worn for cricket stc. though for matches the boys will wear whites from the Colle ge "pool". Mr. Steel asked if everalls were provided for the boys to wear in the Workshops. The Bursar said they were not, but that he would try to procure some, and also white coats for work in the labs. Mr. Harland was asked if the denims could be worn but said that they would not fit well over trousers.


SPORTS MULEMBET.

There is a reasonably generous Grant for this and the Headmenter is dealing with the equipment himself. Equipment for rugger, hockey, cricket etc. will be kept in a locked after room in the Favilion and will be looked after by a store man. There will be another "casual" store of rugger balls etc. so that boys may get practice in passing and kicking and these will probably be in charge of one of the boys.

CASH GRANTS

- 1. The Headmaster has a general College Grant which may be used for any amenities not provided by the College. For instance it may be used to pay travelling expenses of boys going to away matches. This Grant is 1770 for the first year, and 1700 each successive year. The rebate from the Tuck Shop will be paid into this fund.
- 2. There is another fimd for local purchases for educational purposes and for cultural hobbies, e.g. gramophone records. This is

MINUTES OF MASTERS' MESTING, 8th SEPTEMBER, 1953.



The Headmaster suggested that the best discipline was obtained by weight of character rather than by actual pumishment. To begin with discipling should be ultra strict. As this is not an ordinary public school, the boys can be expelled if they are not up to the standard required, but members of the Staff are asked never to threaten boys with this. The threat will only be used by the Headmaster himself as a last resort.

DISCIPLINE IN THE CLASS ROOM.

This is entirely up to the Master concerned, but if a boy is consistently troublesome they can be reported to the Housemaster The Headmaster asked what the Masters thought about boys standing when the Master enters the Classroom. It was decided that boys should stand when the Master goes in, and should stand if the Headmaster goes in, either with visitors, or to speak to the Master, but that if another Master goes in for anything the boys may pomein sitting. In the Labs. and Workshops it is impractical for the boys to stand to attention and they will just carry on with their experiments etc. Mr. Ward asked if there should be a boy at the door of the classroom to say "Stand" when the Master enters, but it was decided that this was not necessary.

DISCIPLING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM.

The Headmaster asked the Masters to be very strict about behaviour in the grounds.

PORMS OF PURISHERY

The Headmaster thought that the only Masters to use the came should be himself and the Housemasters. This was agreed. Any offence which is punishable by caming should be reported to the Housemaster who will, if he thinks it necessary, report it to the Headmaster. Boys will be caned for the following offences: - gross insubordination; emoking; carrying matches or lighters, gross bullying, and breaking bounds. If boys break bounds to go to the cinema, or to a public house they should be beaten and gated; if they break bounds to go for a walk, a beating is sufficient punishment. For indecency, lying and walk, a beating is sufficient punishment. For indecency, lying and cheating a boy should be reported to his housemaster who will give the boy a talking to, and if the offence is repeated the boy should be caned. DETENTION PERICO

STEALING

Any case of stealing, improper possession or dishonesty is to be reported to the Headmaster. In the first place offenders will be reported to the Housemaster who will then pass the culprit on to the Headmaster.

PUNISHMENTS TO BE USED BY PREFECTS

No firm decision was reached on this subject, and the M asters were asked to bear the question in mind. It was thought that for prefects to give the same punishments as the Masters would "debase the carrency". For minor offences prefects will be able to mete cut punishment on the spot, but anything other than this should be reported to the Housemaster. It was decided to leave this question for the moment as no prefectorial system would be in force during the early part of the term. Mr. Davey pointed out that as the term goes on neveral small chores will be needed and these might be used by prefects for punishments.

BREAKING BOUNDS

There was some discussion about the problem of boys being gated over leave-out-weekends. Mr. Harland thought that provided the boys were warned at the beginning of term that they would be gated for breaking bounds and that they would not be allowed out with parents, it would be quite in order to keep them in. It was decided, however, that this would be hard on some parents who, perhaps, had sees way to come to visit the boys, but the Headmarker suggested that if a boy was supposed to be gated over such a weekend, he could be allowed out but should be told that he would be gated for a further week.

MEALS

The boys will go into the Dining Hell and stand quietly until Grace has been said. The Head Frefect, when speciated, will say Grace. It was decided to alter the time of lunch from Mondays to Fridays inclusive to 1.5 p.m. This will give beys time to come down from the Morashope and get washed and tidied up before going into the Dining Hell.

- (b) Boys are not to have matches. Naked lights are not to be used except where permitted e.g. for lighting bunsen burners.
- (c) Electric appliances (e.g. electric heaters, irons, etc.) will only be used in authorized places. On no account will any electric appliance be left with the plug connected to the socket in an enoty room.
- (d) Electrical faults will be reported to the Bursar or Steward. No-one is to tamper with or attempt to repair electric circuits or appliances.

11. FIRE FIGHTING ORGANIZATION

(a) Fire Alarms. There are five manual alarms in the Main Buildings and everyone must know their position (see plan in the Common Room). The general fire alarm is the large bell on the roof of the old Wing. It will be sounded by a Master or Prefect, or under their direct orders. The bell-rope is alongside the lift-shaft in the old Wing. Workeop Fire Brigade is called by dialling 999.

(b) Appliances.

- (i) A large number of extinguishers, hand fire pumps and buckets are sited throughout the College area. The occupants of the various buildings must make it their business to memorize their positions.
- (11) On each floor of the main building there are 4" rising main connections, with "every-way" hose reels along-side them.
- (iii) Three hose ruel carts for use with outside hydrants, are located:-

Two in the Glass Court one in Workshop Yard.

(iv) The Staward, assisted by the College Porter, is responsible that all fire fighting equipment is kept in working order at all times.

(c) Water Supplies

- (i) Besides the rising mains inside the Main Building (see (b)(Ii)), there are 8 hydrants near the Main Building and 12 in the Estate Buildings area. Their position is shown on the map in the Common Room.
- (ii) There are two underground water tanks near the oxford Wing.

(d) Fire Piquet

Will be composed of staff and boys who will be nominated at the beginning of each term. The Steward will supervise their training.

[e] Practices will be ordered from time to time with the object of training the fire piquet, evacuating the building by various routes, and instructing in the use of appliances.

111. ACTION IN CASE OF FIRE

- (a) Anyone discovering a fire, however small, will shout "FIRE", sound the nearest alarm and, if practicable, attack the fire with the nearest appliance. On the alarm, all windows will be closed.
- (b) Worksop Fire Brigade will be called (Dial 999).
 - (i) During affice hours by the Telephone operator.
 - (11) At other times by the Duty Master.
- (c) The fire piquet will assemble immediately, as trained, outside the front door of the follege.
- (d) The remainder will evacuate the heilding by pre-arranged routes according to the location of the fire, and will assemble in the front drive of the Abbey. EVERY BOY MUST BE ACCOUNTED FOR IMMEDIATELY BY DORMITORIES.

LOOKING BACK IN 1972

David Rickard's looked back in the 1972 Edition of the Welbexian with these words:

I was born in 1912. I was appointed Headmaster Designate of Welbeck in July, 1952 and so have spent exactly one third of my life in helping to conceive, to bear and to bring this baby through childhood to manhood. What a truly wonderful experience this has been!

During the Autumn term of 1952 and the Spring term of 1953 I was running a boarding house at Blundell's School and at the same time getting this College started. There was a teaching staff to be appointed, an advertising campaign to be launched, a Selection Board for the first Entry to be convened, a selection procedure to be invented and a thousand and one decisions to be made about how the buildings were to be adapted and other administrative details. Fortunately I had Major-General Gaussen who had already been appointed Bursar on a full time basis. The amount that he did to get the College started is incalculable.

As a result of a massive advertising campaign, there were over 200 applicants for the 48 places of 1 Entry. I was allowed to appoint 7 masters to deal with these. With each subsequent new entry further masters were appointed until, in January 1955, 4 Entry and 15 masters brought the College up to full strength.

Those first 7 masters, 4 of whom are still with us, agreed to join me a fortnight before the beginning of the very first term. During that fortnight we held a Masters' Meeting every day. We discussed a topic a day; College Rules one day, the

Weekly Routine the next and so on for Games, Discipline, Religion, Fire Precautions and so on and so on. Everything had to be worked out from scratch and written directives produced. Fortunately the 8 of us came from a wide variety of schools; we put together what we thought was the best from the many different systems and rejected everything we disliked. What a wonderful opportunity it was to be able to start a school from scratch.

And now, 19 years and 38 Entries later, how much of what was laid down then has stood the test of time and survived? The gradual process of evolution, so necessary to the vitality of a school, has changed almost everything to a greater or lesser degree.

The 8 of us sitting round the table in my study in September 1953 would have been astonished to know that in 1972 the Senior Boys would have a Licensed Club, that casual clothes would be worn at weekends, that the word "bounds" would virtually have disappeared from the College vocabulary, that there would only be one compulsory Chapel Service on Sundays, that the cane would not be in use and that boys would be allowed to go in and out of breakfast when they chose. Just a very few of the countless changes that have gradually happened.

If we had been astonished and perhaps shocked at such visions of the future, we should have been delighted to know that by the year 1972 the College would have a deepened Swimming Pool with filter plant, a miniature Rifle Range, a new Squash Court, a fleet of Sailing Dinghies, five grass Tennis Courts, a Roman Catholic Chapel, an Engineering Drawing Office, a Study or Cabin for every boy, newly built Science Laboratories and Lecture Rooms, and a new Dining Hall and Kitchens. Looking back now, one wonders how we managed without these and many more facilities that now

I am sure that all 8 of us would have been glad to know that, in 1972, the standards we were then trying to set in discipline, in personal appearance, in physical fitness, in manners, in morals and in human relationships would be more than lived up

Visitors to the College, of whom we have very many, admire the magnificence of the setting and the splendid facilities. Almost every visitor remarks upon the friendly, open, happy atmosphere that exists here and this to me is the most important thing of all. May this warm, healthy, delightful atmosphere endure for what I hope will be the very long life of Welbeck College.
